### Fin de Siècle Vienna and Berlin: 1871–1914

## **Course Description:**

From romanticism to expressionism, from socialism to imperialism, Vienna and Berlin constituted a veritable maelstrom of ideologies in the era following the Franco-Prussian War. From the indulgent cafe culture of Vienna to the bitter cynicism of Brecht and Weill's Berlin, these two cities represent the culmination—and, ultimately, the decadence and destruction—of an entire European culture. This course will examine figures, trends, and movements such as the clash between authoritarianism and liberalism in Berlin; the expressionism of painters such as Klimt and Kokoschka; composers from Mahler to the Second Viennese School, the revolutionary and influential philosophies of Freud and Wittgenstein, and political figures such as Bismarck.
